New tax on electric vehicles penalizes consumers and won't solve road funding problems in Washington

Why EV taxes are a poor choice

- Washington's gas tax accounts for only 32% of state's road funding.
- EV taxes can **discourage consumers** from purchasing a fuel-efficient or gas-free vehicle, which help reach emissions and climate goals.



- If a state decides to institute an EV tax it should **delay implementation** until EVs are widely adopted and a more serious source of revenue.
- Flat fixed fees don't charge people based on how much they drive.
- EV taxes are collected as a lump sum, which is especially burdensome for low-income drivers, because it does not spread out costs over time like the gas tax.
