Re: Arsenic, Cadmium, Lead, and Mercury Disclosures for Baby Food Products

Dear Mr. Hart,

We write to urge Aldi to comply with California law and publicly disclose test results for the levels of arsenic, cadmium, lead and mercury in each lot of its Little Journey Organics baby food products. Based on our searches, this information currently does not appear to be available on the Aldi's website at <https://www.aldi.us/>.

This disclosure would be consistent with the obligations under Section 110962 of California's Health and Safety Code, which requires that baby food manufacturers post these test results on their website. See California's Department of Public Health's Frequently Asked Questions [webpage](#) for more information.

We urge Aldi to make the information publicly available to allow consumers to access test results before they go shopping. And when it does, it should not require the public to provide the lot code for the product to obtain test results. Requiring lot code information to access test results is not consumer-friendly and may be inconsistent with the legal requirements to make this information publicly available.
